
PORTRAIT OF AN ARTIST

NOEL

A Gifted Hunter of Cubist Realism

Noel Suarez Rodriguez grew up in Havana in the early Sixties in an era of turmoil where artistry itself was a challenge. Mother was a professional dancer and Dad was an artist and a photographer. He came out to himself and his family as a teenager. "Being gay was never an issue for my family;" he says, "Right from the beginning they always encouraged me to be myself." And he has done so beautifully.



Ballet was Noel's first love and from this skill he learned disciple and persistence. At 28 years of age, a knee injury cut his career short and forced him to take a closer look at the

human body and at the way people move. Those observations continue to serve him well today.

He painted, but never felt quite ready or good enough. In 1986 friends convinced him to mount a show of his work. "I had this idea of how tough it is for artists. I always heard about how few of them find success. And I was especially discouraged because I was so used to making a living off of my craft as a dancer, and I didn't want to struggle."

Despite all the richness of his artistic background, none was more surprised than Noel himself when people began to buy his paintings. That first show of 13 paintings sold out completely and Noel has not had to struggle since then. His style recalls the art decomurals of the fifties cinemas and public buildings. He calls it a cross between Cubism and

Realism, but the vision is pure Noel.

The grandeur of his style lends itself well to large depictions and Noel recently sold one which measured 60×52 inches. He has also accepted and fulfilled a number of com-


missioned paintings for private and corporate clients. Last year he sold more than 20 of his paintings in prices ranging from \$750 to \$10,000. "My subjects have always been androgynous," he states. "One of the reasons people love my females is that they're solid and muscular. I have also tried to portray a softness in my male subjects." Just last week, he closed a show in South Beach, Florida which marked his first exhibit of strictly male images.

He still has many years ahead of him and no doubt we will soon see some of his works transformed into mosaics in the marble halls of major museums, theaters and government memorials. Meanwhile, he continues to appreciate the flexibility and power of the human form at its best.

The paintings on exhibit at Passions Gallery here in Provincetown will be a conbination of male and female images

and the show will be dedicated to the late Franco Colombo whom Noel befriended a few years ago while living in Provincetown. At the time, Franco exhibited some of his early works in his restaurant—Franco's By The Sea.
